At the end of January, Week 4 the 2021 legislative session saw fireworks on the House floor while debating bills on abortion and transgender. The first weeks of the session have been mostly focused on moral and cultural issues, and Week 5 may bring

members engage in that really set the tone for what we advocate for during this heightened time for legislative advocacy. Then it is our SAM Legislative Network that makes sure our voice is heard on the many issues of advocacy. What a great process and strategy.

At this point of the session (week 5), the tumultuous feel of the ship that has swayed left is being pushed by strong waves to the right. So much so, that the ship may begin taking on water. When it comes to the education of our children, SAM's advocacy work is to "right the ship". Our children and communities deserve a high quality system of public schools to provide equitable, quality education to each child, every day! Politics aside, we must focus on the ship sailing smoothly in heavy waves. That effort requires close attention to attempts of the legislature to overreach into the policy making arena, a responsibility of the Board of Public Education (per Montana's Constitution), when it comes to our system of public schools. Know that the SAM process as outlined above provides us the best opportunity to "right the ship" as it continues to sway mightily through the remaining weeks of the 67th legislative session. Thank you to all SAM members for being ready for an "all hands on deck" call in the coming weeks.

The impact of COVID-19 on our lives, schools and communities has created challenges and far too many opportunities for our administrators to learn all it takes to keep your children, staff, school, and community moving in a positive education direction. I want to thank every SAM member for the strong effort, perseverance, expertise, passion and compassion that I observe daily as you care for your school community. Your efforts are "righting the ship" for your entire community. Montana is fortunate to have outstanding school leaders serving our children during these challenging times.

The SAM board of directors met virtually on January 20 and used their meeting time to discuss the impact of the pandemic, and focused their thoughts on what school will need to look like after the pandemic. This rich dialogue from Montana education leaders provided our SAM association with key insight into future professional learning opportunities and supports for our members going forward. This is an effort to "right the ship" and focus on what is most important for professional learning opportunities. Thank you SAM board members for your

the first look at the fiscal status of the state. SAM/MT-PEC provided testimony on 4 bills this week, described in the highlights of the week. The [SAM Testimony Log 2021 Legislative Session](#) shows that SAM has provided testimony 26 times on 25 different bills at this point in the session.

The legislature has now produced 3335 bill drafts with 485 introduced bills. SAM advocacy is tracking 373 bill drafts with 89 of those bills introduced. [SAM Followed Bills 1.29.21](#) and [SAM Followed Bills Prioritized Introduced 1.29.21](#) are updated and uploaded to the [SAM Bills 2021](#) webpage.

The [SAMLN21 Legislative Update 5 1-29-21](#) and [Podcast 5](#) along with [SAMLN21 Schedule Week 5 Feb 1-5 Revised 1-30-21](#) are there to keep you in the know on all progress during the 2021 Legislative session.

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

Reach Higher Montana is a nonprofit organization whose mission is to help students strategically pursue education after high school. Services are provided free of charge for schools and students and include information on postsecondary educational opportunities, programs and funding for youth in foster care, access to scholarships and outreach on finding and applying for scholarships, and intermediary services for youth apprenticeships.

Reach Higher Montana helps students explore postsecondary educational opportunities, find and apply for scholarships, and explore career interests and opportunities. Reach Higher Montana also provides educator scholarships to fund advanced education requirements to provide dual enrollment opportunities, and provides community grant funding to support educational attainment through locally-designed initiatives. Youth apprenticeships provide students ages 16-19 to pursue career and education interests simultaneously, which shortens their time to degree, saves money, and helps meet workforce needs.

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
