Minutes from September Meeting Membership Options Recruitment Budget and Overview CASE reporting template Today's meeting was called to order at 3:57 p.m. on September 18, 2017 by President Elect, Michelle Halberg in the absence of President, Karen Underwood.

Michelle referenced the MCASE website for meeting participants in order to access information related to MCASE, as well as School Administrators of Montana (SAM) and its other affiliates. She acknowledged Jenifer Cline (OPI and past MCASE President) for supporting our organization and collaborating with Dave Means in temporarily filling the role of MCASE Past President due to transition of multiple officers within recent years.

Executive Board Members (Halberg, Covington, Meehan, Von Bergen) also introduced themselves and discussed their roles within their districts, Co-ops, and regions. Michelle also indicated that Laurie Smith was unable to attend the business meeting and is now on the MCASE Governing Board as the CEC Representative.

Michelle discussed changes to the Communication Sciences Dept. at the U of M from which many of our School Speech Pathologists are trained and recruited. Steven Moats (CSD Clinical Coordinator) is leaving UM for alternate position. There have been recent conversations with him about certification for Speech Assistants in areas where Speech Path positions are not able to be filled, as well as conversations related to UM emphasis on the Ph. D. Program for Speech Pathologists. Laurie Ruffier (Recruitment Project) also discussed that she is now unable to access first and second year Graduate students to talk about school positions in Montana as part of the Recruitment Project.

Michelle talked about the great work of so many MCASE members, Special Educators, Related Service Providers and community partners throughout the state of Montana and encouraged us to begin thinking of people within our districts, coops, and regions who should be nominated for awards throughout the state. There are multiple awards opportunities throughout the different affiliates of SAM.

Kirk Miller, Executive Director of SAM, encouraged participants to attend the OPI meeting tomorrow to get updated information related to DPHHS cuts and the impact on Part C to B transitions, as well as other funding and legislative/legal matters related to schools and Special Education. He also encouraged new persons to connect with OPI staff throughout the year for additional support and resources. He talked about the kickoff for New Administrator/Director training and collaboration with OPI to offer it on Sept. 19 and 20 in Billings following this MCASE/MASS Conference and the benefits to a network of support.

Kirk also discussed the Special Education New Directors Collegial Learning Network. Jeff Blessum is a provider and facilitating the special education coaches/providers within the program with Godfrey Saunders collaborating with OPI to be sure all needs are addressed and plan for collaborative opportunities between colleagues/participants. It is a great opportunity for mentoring and personalized learning specific to needs of district, schools, or personnel.

Michelle Halberg discussed the MCASE Budget and that membership is slightly lower than in the past. She addressed the importance of being able to tell current and future administrators what MCASE has to offer them individually, as well as their district, schools, or coops. Additional topics included:

- Reminding people of discounted membership for those enrolling in more than one Sam affiliate.
- MCASE Executive Board agreed to add \$5000 to the line item of National Legislative Leadership
  Conference to allow an MCASE Representation at the national level. This will strengthen our
  presence in lawmaking, as well as allow networking efforts between all Montana educationally
  focused agencies and their senators. Tamra Covington will be representing MCASE at the next
  conference.
- Rick Duncan, Jenifer Cline, and Emily Maule discussed the value of a MT presence at National Conferences.
- MCASE investment threshold is 150% of the operating budget.
- MCASE contributes \$4,000 annually to build a reserve, or "nest egg" to sustain the Recruitment Project if needed in the event that enrollment does not cover costs. The goal was for MCASE to build \$25,000, then back out of that responsibility and allow it to sustained independently.

Lori Ruffier reported on the Recruitment Project.

- Explained reasons and benefits of the Recruitment Project.
- Discussed a national shortage in Special Education related positions.
- She attended her first "virtual" career fair this year to recruit students to consider jobs in schools. The Home Grown program in high schools to recruit students into Special education related positions such as Teachers, Occupational Therapists, Physical Therapists, Speech Pathologists. etc. is strong. Lori highlighted the Recruitment tab within MCASE as it has suggestions how to promote career fairs in your high schools.
- She also spoke to the Montana High School Counselors Association to encourage them to suggest Special Education positions to students as possible career opportunities.
- Sanders County Co-op received 9 applicants for the Special Education Director position.
- \$150 per year is the cost for a Class C school to join the Recruitment Project.

Dale Lambert broached the question of how to better support and assure sustainable funding for the Recruitment Project. The Recruitment Committee will work on how to best address this concern. The membership was asked to email Lori Ruffier with feedback regarding the Recruitment Project, as well as suggestions related to improving and sustaining it.

Meeting was adjourned at 5:15 p.m.
