## Thanksgiving...A Time for Reflection

Happy Thanksgiving! With our first major holiday just around the corner, I am reminded of the value of taking time for reflection. We have a great deal to be thankful for in the state of Montana. Despite our challenges and sometimes because of these same challenges, we offer a solid education to *all* our students. Moving to a more specialized area of education several years ago, I am ever more grateful for the dedication our colleagues demonstrate; the support, trust, and active involvement shown by the parents of our students; and the work ethic exercised by our students.

As we move through our school year, I invite you to meet the challenges of our profession while truly appreciating the dedication of those around you and appreciating the process involved in making progress. Most recently, we need to be impressed and bolstered by the collaborative efforts shown during this past legislature. Recall just a few years ago when educational entities were competing with each other and forwarding separate agendas.

As we all know, the needs of our students are growing. More is required of us in order to address their needs, talents, and future roles. We have underserved gifted students, unfunded mandates for special education students, and understaffed classrooms. Obviously, we need financial support and we are compelled to be creative with all our resources including time, facilities, money, and personnel. Nonetheless, we see districts approaching their receptive communities with building projects and following a principled path of commitment.

Facing our challenges, we need to develop the professionals and be thankful for those who have selected education as a career. We need to look at not only recruitment but also development and retention of those individuals who have selected this career path. We are fortunate to have professional development tools like SAM, CSPD, OPI, our universities, etc., for developing the staffs within our schools including our support staffs and particularly our paraprofessionals. We likewise have the advantages technology affords our delivery of professional support so that we are no longer tied to specific times, places, or limited topics.

We are in an exciting time to support our teachers. It is easier for us to seek opportunities for them and to be responsive to their professional needs. Along these lines, we are also obligated to address their everyday responsibilities like being cognizant of class sizes or caseloads, additional non-teaching responsibilities, and overall demands.

An additional and difficult responsibility we have is to recruit and train successful special education substitutes for both our teacher and paraprofessional positions. Many of our substitutes shy away from assignments in special education classrooms simply because they are not aware of the roles which they will be asked to perform. We can strip away these inhibitions if we are more deliberate in our training and role delineations. Thankfully, there are resources available.

As yet another way to support, we need to address our own professional growth and how it influences teachers' work and, in turn, student success. Our professional development in becoming more knowledgeable of functional behavior assessments, being active members in developing behavior plans, and being "process leaders," where we use our roles to complement our service providers, is ever more important. We jeopardize our effectiveness and our teachers' efforts if we do not engage actively in the processes associated with our roles and most especially the special education process.

I am grateful too that we have already laid the necessary foundation for effective progress monitoring within our schools. These activities benefit all our educational efforts and definitely support the development of special education plans. Given the Endrew F. Supreme Court decision at the beginning of the year, we are reminded to do our jobs well in documenting student progress to ensure "meaningful educational benefit," creating defensible IEP's, and engaging parents actively in our processes. We need solid, reliable and frequent data to accomplish these tasks. Our current and future expanded efforts in this direction will serve all well.

And last but not least, I am grateful for the skill set administrators possess. We actively listen and we can provide our audiences with our full attention. Our direct contact with people is all the more critical in these technological times. As you well know, we have many competing responsibilities as school leaders and ever-fluctuating priorities, but we compromise all our efforts if we fail to step back and listen well.

The following MAEMSP awards are now open for application and/or nomination:

## MAEMSP - Friends of Education (Due Feb.

**9)** This award is given to any person in the community who has gone above and beyond with duties that support and promote public education. The recipient of this award must be a private citizen that is outside the professional educational

#### MAEMSP - Adrian Langstaff Award (Due

Feb. 9) This award is one of the highest recognitions that the Montana Association of Elementary and Middle School Principals can be awarded to a deserving member. The award is in the name and memory of Adrian Langstaff. Adrian was an outstanding elementary principal who was a very recognized leader in his school, community and state. His life was cut short in a tragic accident.

MAEMSP – Aspiring Principal Scholarship Award (Due Feb. 9) MAEMSP provides an annual Scholarship/Incentive Grant of \$800 to a student successfully applying to or currently enrolled in an approved course of study for the Master of Education Degree in Elementary School Education. The applicant must have completed three years of successful teaching in elementary or middle school education (K-8) and hold a current Montana Class II teaching certificate.

## Changes to Your Affiliate E-List

You may have noticed changes to your affiliate elist. Each affiliate president voted at the October 19th SAM Board meeting to change the response structure of the affiliate e-list from "Reply to Author" to "Reply to Entire List". Many members have communicated that they want to see the responses to emails that are sent through their affiliate e-list. However, if you do not want your affiliate's e-list communication being sent to your email inbox, you have the ability to modify your notification settings. You have the option to receive e-list messages through your email or to view the messages through your SAM profile on the website.

To modify your e-list email notification settings, follow these steps:

- Go to the <u>SAM website</u> and click on "Member Login" at the top of the page. Login to your SAM profile with your Username (your email address) and your Password.
- 2. Click on "My Profile" in the Quick Links menu.
- 3. Hover over "My Features" and click on "E-Lists".
- Keep the email delivery to ON if you prefer to receive e-list messages through your email, or turn the email delivery to OFF if you prefer to view messages from your

The Montana Council of Administrators of Special Education would like to annually award those special education leaders, special educators, and classroom teachers that excel at their positions and deserve to be recognized for their efforts.

## MASSP - NASSP Principal of the Year

(Opening in January) This award is given to a deserving individual who demonstrates outstanding leadership in providing high-quality education within their building. These principals are recognized by their peers for the contributions they have made to their students, staff, and community in implementing educational excellence.

MASSP – Community Partner in Education Award (Opening in January) The CPE Award is given to an individual who provides great support to public education and is always there to help out in any way possible for the good of the school and the students. The candidate must be a private citizen outside the professional educational field.

MASSP – Future Administrators
Scholarship (Opening in January) This
award comes in the form of a \$1100 scholarship
provided to a graduate student who is in at least
their 2nd semester of an approved course of study
for the Master of Education Degree in Secondary
School Administration. The candidate cannot be
financially supported by a school district and
cannot be a double recipient of the MAEMSP and
MASSP scholarships. Finally, the candidate must

also intend to keep working in Montana.

META – Technologist of the Year Award (Opening Soon) This award is established to recognize the fine achievements and successes of a Montana K-12 School Technologist (Tech Coordinator, Tech Director, Tech Specialist, etc) at the State level. Eligible candidates for this award must be 2017-18 META members.

School Administrators of Montana, as well as the leadership of these affiliates, would hope that nominations of deserving individuals will be made for each one of the above awards.
