Generally revise laws related to Montana facility finance authority

1/9/2023 - Basically the bill extends the availability of tax advantaged bonds to private parochial K-12 schools. Note from Montana Facility Finance Authority: The US Supreme Court ruling that caused the proposed change is Carson v. Makin. CAMPS will monitor this bill as it appears the process of providing access to these state bonds is protected by recent supreme court case.

#### Revise the Quality Educator Loan Assistance Program

1/23/2023 - Dennis will support for CAMPS, but will point out some concerns with the fiscal note : SB70 but will take issue with the assumptions in the fiscal note for the 2nd year of the biennium that there will continue to be a 10% increase in usage. Once the initial increase has occurred in the first year there is no evidence that the number or percentage of new positions will increase by 10% each year thereafter. I will suggest that 5% increase is more reasonable thus cutting the projected state budget increase in half.

01/23/23 - Hearing

1/11/2023 - EA in committee: No action taken, postponed til Monday. One Senator had concern that there were a few Senators absent. Another Senator showed up so they reopened EA on this bill. Sen. Fuller voiced concern about tax-payer subsidy about forgiving student loan. Leg. Staff showed OPI Map regarding qualified schools. Sen. Emrich questioned the effectiveness of the program. Questioned if it would actually encourage teachers to go to rural schools. Bill passed.

1/7/2023 - This bill removes some requirements for rural districts to make it easier to qualify for the loan assistance program. Many districts were not using this option as it was difficult to justify some requirements. This should help all rural districts access this program for their staff. CAMPS will support this bill.

What happens if a district does not adopt policy? Question about timeline for when a student could request transfer. Question about class size accommodations, bill sponsor said that the bill was drawn broadly enough to allow for district to establish guidelines for expectations to meet District strategic plan. Question about how it will impact smaller schools. How would bill address mobility issues: this bill wold create a process for transfer, where a consistent process does not exist. What about requests for athletic transfers? Not addressed directly in the bill. Parents make decisions for request to transfer.

1/16/2023 - Clarifies in-person offsite instruction vs. remote instruction. Off-site instruction = in-person within the boundaries of a district. Remote instruction. Proponents - CAMPS. Will no longer impact mandatory enrollment. It will just impact 20-7-118. Opponents included representative for Hutterite colonies as this bill now requires that school districts only serve schools that are within their geographic boundaries. The situation with the colony schools should be solved by a multi-district agreement, rather that what is currently being done through off-site instruction.

We understand that the Board of Public Ed can establish an advisory council outside of state statute, however we believe that the current statute has important language regarding the makeup of the council. We believe that it is important for the Board to have advisory from a council of professionals, currently working in the field, and we believe the current statute establishes such a council. Should this bill pass, the Board will create their own advisory council (under the authority given in 2-15-122, MCA) of education practitioners and professionals to continue to give advice and make recommendations to the Board.

The attached fiscal note shows that there will be no fiscal impact, as the Board will continue to need funding to support the new advisory council. I just received this fiscal note this morning with the \$0 fiscal impact.

We were concerned that it would take away the opportunity for a district to use the approved, 5-star rated, 10 passenger vehicles for depreciation. We secured a letter from OPI which states the legislative intent of the bill. While a bill amendment would be better, we don't want to kick the hornets nest on this one, by drawing too much attention to the current statute, which could inadvertently limit our current abilities to access bus depreciation for some vehicles. We believe that this still protects districts who have purchased and are currently using the approved 10 passenger, 5 star rated vehicles. They will still be able to access bus depreciation for those vehicles as was part of the original statute. The new proposed language would limit the other types of vehicles that don't meet those standards. A district could still use those other vehicles for transportation and activities, but won't be able to access bus depreciation. Revise dissemination of obscene material to minors laws

1/20/2023 - SAM decided not to weigh in on this bill. If it passes, there is a danger that school staff could face criminal prosecution for providing obscene materials, however, that charge would have to meet definition in law and would have to be supported by local county attorney - which may be highly unlikely given the breadth of the definition. However, opposing the bill may have created harm to the organization as we would have been seen as trying to support the idea that we want our members to have the freedom to provide obscene (also called pornographic in committee hearing) materials to minors. Not a favorable position for SAM. There is a legitimate fear of government controlled censorship created by this bill, which was a very clear argument made by public libraries. Public libraries are in a better position to make this argument as they serve both children and adults.

1/18/2023 - Statement from MTSBA: The bill is a bit confusing. Not because of the way the bill is drafted but because of the way the underlying law is drafted. The underlying law says it is illegal to display obscene material to children, but it creates an exception for libraries and schools. I can't imagine the discussion that took place when this law was first drafted where someone asked for an exemption from the law, so that we could distribute obscene material to children. Fighting this bill at this point will allow others to claim that we are seeking to "continue" providing obscene material to children. We won't make any difference in the outcome of this bill by weighing in, but it will harm our credibility in other areas where we need collaboration.

The following definition is what we would be seeking to allow school districts to show the kids if we oppose the bill, which is proposing to eliminate the exemption for public schools from compliance with this law.

45-8-201(2) A thing is obscene if:

(a) (i) it is a representation or description of perverted ultimate sexual acts, actual or simulated;

- (ii) it is a patently offensive representation or description of normal ultimate sexual acts, actual or simulated; or
- (iii) it is a patently offensive representation or description of masturbation, excretory functions, or lewd exhibition of the genitals; and
- (b) taken as a whole the material:

(i) applying contemporary community standards, appeals to the prurient interest in sex;

(ii) portrays conduct described in subsection (2)(a)(i), (2)(a)(ii), or (2)(a)(iii) in a patently offensive way; and

(iii) lacks serious literary, artistic, political, or scientific value.
