Revise laws related to school safety teams

1/31/2023 - This bill requires an annual review of school safety or emergency operations plans by trustees, clarifies that schools safety funds may be used for communitywide programs and training, and requires interdisciplinary Childe information and school safety teams to adopt written agreements for operations. SAM will testify on behalf of the coalition.

Provide that use of a name and sex by a student is not discrimination

1/31/2023 - New Section: The trustees of a school district may not adopt a policy that subjects a student to disciplinary action for behavior that is not considered an unlawful discriminatory practice pursuant to 49-2-307(2).

Don't think this statement is workable. School districts adopt lots of discipline policies for actions that may not be defined in unlawful discriminatory practices. For example: a student could be disciplined for assault, which is not in the list of unlawful discriminatory practice.

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Increase penalties for passing school buses

1/31/2023 - Written testimony sent to committee: On behalf of the School Administrators of Montana we support HB 366, which seeks to increase penalties for drivers who pass a school bus while the bus is loading and unloading students. When a bus is stopped and the bus lights are flashing, this is a clear signal that the bus is in the process of loading or unloading students. As the bus driver is monitoring students entering and exiting the bus, he/she does not often have the capacity to monitor the behavior of other drivers. It is in this critical time when it is most important for all drivers to adhere to the procedures outlined in MCA 61-8-351. We support the increased penalties for those drivers who fail to follow state law as we believe this may increase the likelihood of compliance to state law. Student safety to and from school is a high priority for all schools. We believe the changes proposed in HB366 will help to improve bus safety for all. Provide for deadlines to respond to public information requests

1/31/2023 - This bill amends public records laws to require acknowledgment of a public information request within 5 days of receiving the request. Note that Districts would be required to acknowledge the request, but the District is not required to fulfill request in 5 days. The majority of the bill deals with requirements for executive agencies - not school districts.
